IN THE SENATE SENATE JOINT PROCLAMATION NO. 101 BY STATE AFFAIRS COMMITTEE A PROCLAMATION COMMENDING THE CITY OF STAR FOR BEING INCORPORATED AS A CITY.

we, the members of the Senate and the House of Representatives of the State of Islaho assembled in the Second

Regular Session of the Fifty-fourth Idaho Legislature, do hereby proclaim:

- WHEREAS, the City of Star was incorporated December 10, 1997, as a city and joins the ranks of Eagle, Kuna, Meridia Garden City, and Boise as incorporated cities in Ada County, and
- WHEREAS, this is a historic occasion since the last city to become incorporated in idaho was the City of Dover in Bonner county in the late 1980's, and
- WHEREAS, the Northwestern geographical area of Ada County known as Star is experiencing significant population growth;
- WHEREAS, residents of star believe the common good of their growing community would be enhanced if they were incorporated as a city; and
- WHEREAS, this incorporation columnated following two years of work by residents who sought such incorporation; and WHEREAS, incorporation as a city will enable the mayor and eity courcil to determine local issues and as a city, the City of Star will set local loss, provide services, and exercise load use planning.
- NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT PROCLAIMED by the members of the Secult and the Hause of Representatives assembled in the second Regular Session of the Fifty-fourth idebo Legislature, that we congratulate the residents of Star for their "con-do" attitude in making the incorporation happen and hereby commensate the incorporation of the City of Star
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Legislature of the State of Jaho would like to state: As peels have howered the beauty of the stars in the galaxy, the Jaho Legislature howers its very own Star. While it only brinkles in size to many other Jaho etitis, its residents have an inner warmth of goodness, friendliness and commonity spirit. We are coulded these qualities will shine forth like diamonds in the sky, as the use city of Star takes its place as one of idahors shinting examples of good and wise maniford approvement.
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Secretary of the Senate be, and she is hereby authorized to send a copy of this proclamation to the mayor and the secretary of the City of star.


STAR POLICE

Star is a Dual County City (Ada and Canyon Counties)

- * Ada County Sheriff's Deputies are deputized to provide service inside Star City Limits within Canyon County.
- * Prosecution agreements are in place with both Ada and Canyon County Prosecutors.
- * Those arrested on the Ada County side go to the Ada County Jail in Boise.
- * Those arrested on the Canyon County side go to the Canyon County Jail in Caldwell.

STAR FIRE DISTRICT Star Fire Chief Greg Timinsky

- 21 fire fighters and two emergency vehicle technicians man the two fire stations. Station 51 is located across from Albertsons and Station 52 at Kingsbury.
- In 2023, a new station may be built on Floating Feather across from the church/cemetery with land donated from development. This building is paid for with impact fees from new construction.
- Star Fire District was established in 1953 and covers 55 square miles within Ada and Canyon Counties.
- Every new home built is required to pay \$ 809.00 impact fee, every new commercial building pays \$0.38/square foot for an impact fee. Monies are used for capital improvements only.
- Three Fire Commissioners: Jared Moyle, Tim Murray and Steve Martin.

New Growth Mitigation Fees

- HB389 created a scenario where new growth could not service our current public safety
- 100% of Star's Property Tax revenue to the City pay for our Police Budget
- The Building Contractors Association (BCA) came to the table to assist with the necessary public safety
- Star Fire District needs funds to hire a minimum of nine fire fighters for the new station on Floating Feather
- The agreed upon mitigation fees are:
 - \$ 1,120.00 Police Mitigation Fee per each new residential unit
 - \$1,200.00 Fire Mitigation Fee per each new residential unit
 - Passed unanimously by the Star City Council 4-0, City of Star Resolution 006-2022
 - Funds to be used only on personnel

STAR SEWER & WATER DISTRICT


- SSWD is a very high-tech water and sewer system.
- Rates have only increased once in the past 15 years.
- With the current system there are roughly 11,389 water and sewer connections available. Only a little over 6,000 have been used.
- The Sewage Treatment Plant is currently going through a \$30 million dollar required upgrade, slated to be completed in December 2022.
- The new Joplin Road lift station has been completed and operational. This station will service all areas south of the Boise River.
- The West Canyon lift station, near Kingsbury starts construction in October 2022. This station will service all areas of Star in Canyon County to Kingsbury Road.
- A 1-million-gallon water storage tank was recently completed in the foothills.
- A new city well is currently being drilled and tested near Star Road and Highway 20/26.

STAR SEWER & WATER DISTRICT

- Growing concerns regarding ground water and water supply.
- Per Idaho Department of Water Resources, Star is positioned very well with the aquifer utilized for our city water.
- 1,098,700-acre feet of water inflows into the aquifer annually with 1,056,600-acre feet of water used by all the sources tapped into it.
- Net result is an increase of 42,100-acre feet of water recharging our aquifer annually.
- All water entities are monitoring our water supply.

Ground Water Budget






Three Transportation Agencies Serve Star

- Idaho Transportation Department (ITD) Responsible for Highway 44, Highway 16 and Highway 20/26.
- Ada County Highway District (ACHD) Responsible for all roads in Star on the Ada County side of our city.
- Canyon Highway District #4 (CHD4) Responsible for all roads in Star on the Canyon County side of our city.

Idaho Transportation Department (ITD)

- In April 2020, the City of Star and ITD entered into an agreement for proportionate share payments from development.
- All funds collected stay with the City of Star and will be used on state highway improvements within the City of Star's planning area.
- We currently have a little over \$4,845,327.00 committed to this fund.
- First project to use these funds will be widening Highway 44 from Star Road to Can Ada Road in the spring of 2023.

ITD Future Projects Timeline

Upcoming projects to be completed by ITD that will help mobility for Star residents:

- Highway 16 expansion from 20/26 to I-84 (2022-2025)
 Construction started in the summer of 2022
- Highway 44 five lanes from Highway 16 to Star Road (2024)
- Highway 20/26 five lanes from I-84 to Highway 16 (2022-2024)
 Construction started in the summer of 2022

Ada County Highway District (ACHD)

- Relationships have improved with ACHD over the past few years. Mary May our ACHD Commissioner representative for Star has worked with me to improve this relationship.
- ACHD provides all road improvements, permitting and maintenance for over 5,230 center lane miles in Ada County.
- City of Star has worked hard to get projects included in ACHD's Integrated Five Year Work Plan.
- Each new home built pays \$3,493.00 in impact fees to ACHD.

Canyon Highway District #4 (CHD4)

- The City of Star has helped fund and create CHD4 first ever impact fee program. Approved by Star City Council on September 7, 2021.
- Many projects within Star's planning area have been identified for improvements.
- Impact fees for homes in Canyon County portion of Star will be \$5,050.00.

Fiber/Internet

- Working on a city-wide fiber network.
- We require subdivisions to put fiber conduit in their developments to encourage fiber suppliers to provide services.
- Provided wireless fiber networks for public use at Hunter's Creek Park and Star Riverhouse through a \$300,000.00+ fiber grant.






- Reduced available density by 20%

Forgone are dollars not levied in taxes from previous years thru a combination of the 3% increase plus annexations and/or new construction. With HB389 we are only able to tax 1% of the Forgone to increase or property tax levied amount if we are under the 8% maximum allowed increase.
